Brief History of Hotel

Built in 1844, just three years after the settlement of New Plymouth, the first White Hart was a modest six-roomed house built chiefly of rimu and miro sawn by hand at a pit in the bush about two miles away. When the Imperial troops came to Taranaki the building was used as a hospital and it was from the White Hart that the first military funeral in the settlement moved away. After being made a licensed hotel in 1852 the building continued to make history. Among the White Hart's notable firsts are: The first Cobb's coach to New Plymouth arrived at the hotel's doors at 9.15 p.m. on January 12, 1871; a highwayman "stuck up"; a number of men in the White Hart bar on February 11, 1893, and got away with some small change off a tray and a bottle.
