

# Will Build Retreading Factory

A 4500 square foot tyre retreading factory is to be built by the Reliance Tyre and Rubber Company on a quarter-acre section at the corner of Devon and Hobson Streets, New Plymouth.

## Jailed For Keeping Brothel

P.A. Auckland. A 32-year-old housewife was gaoled for seven months yesterday for keeping part of the premises she occupied as a brothel.

Dorothy Eleanor Crowe was convicted by a Supreme Court jury on August 27. Mr Justice Gresson told Crowe that if she repeated the offence, she was likely to get a much heavier sentence. The maximum term was five years.

The offence for which she was being charged took place shortly after Crowe had completed a six months' sentence on a similar charge, he said.

The ministers will conduct a two-week nationwide crusade at the invitation of the New Zealand Baptist Union.

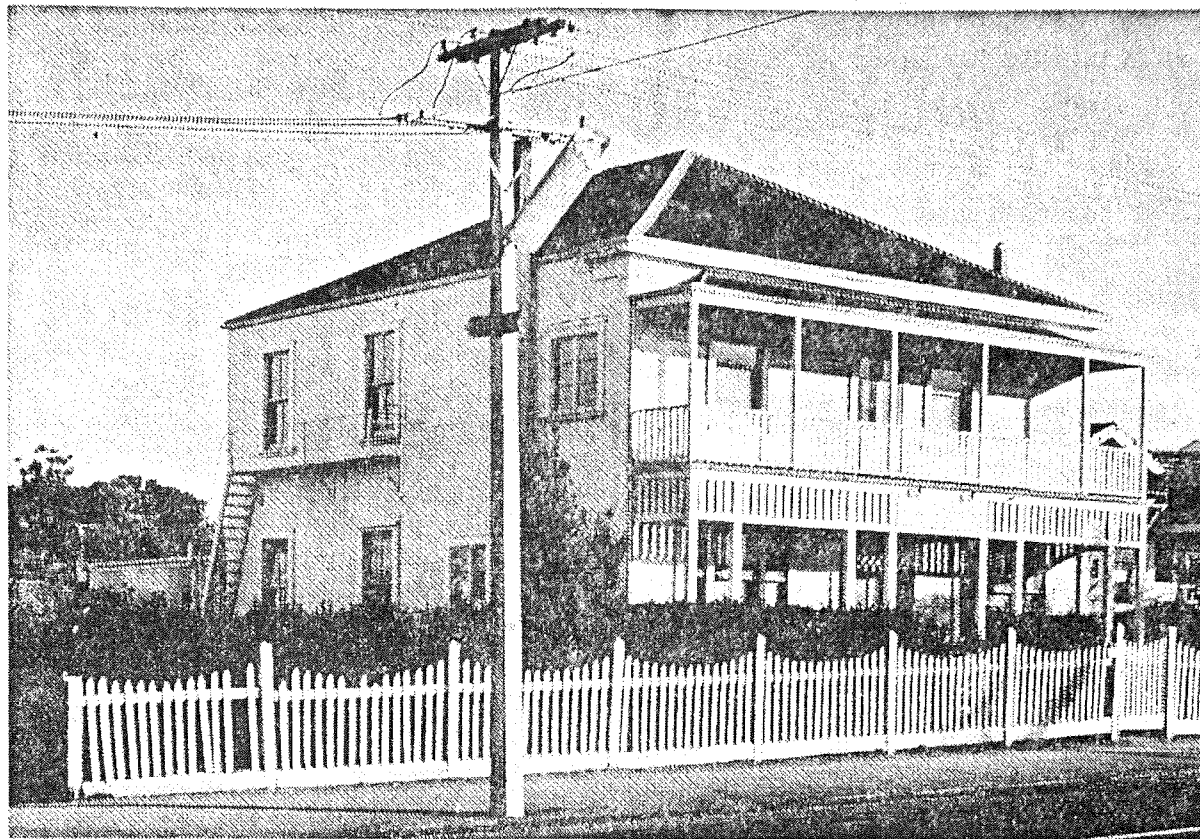
The company spent two years looking for a suitable factory site before paying £8500 for the section. A large two-storey house is at present on the property.

Private motorists would be catered for as well as carriers and other commercial operators. A feature of the factory would be a reception lounge where customers, particularly women, could wait while their cars were receiving attention.

The factory's staff would be recruited locally and would work under the direction of Mr. E. D. Morgan, the company's present Wanganui branch manager. Mr. M. Wright, the company's resident representative at New Plymouth, would become Wanganui branch manager, Mr. Dean said.
