WELLINGTON, This Day.—The Government should know within ten days if New Zealand can establish an economical iron and steel industry.

The inter-departmental committee set up by the Minister of Industries and Commerce, Mr. Holloway, to investigate the feasibility of an iron and steel industry will make its preliminary report in a week or so.

The committee's latest move to gather all possible expert opinion was to obtain the views of Dr. T. P. Colclough, one of Britain's foremost consultants.

Dr. Colclough was brought from England by Fletcher Holdings Ltd and Industrial Metals Ltd. (Well-ington), who have together made proposals for the early establishment of a New Zealand iron and steel industry.

He and Fletcher representatives saw Mr. Holloway this morning. Later Mr. G. Fraser, a spokesman for the Fletcher group, said that Dr. Colclough would be in Wellington until (the end of next week, when he returns to Britain.

Before then he hopes to meet the principal people interested in Iron and steel development.

Dr. Colclough speni eight months in New Zealand 19 years ago in connection with the Onekaka project and he has heid many important positions in the United Kingdom from and steel industry.
